### Mzima Springs

One of the best attractions that Tsavo has to offer!

zima Springs are a series of four natural springs in the Tsavo National Park, Kenya. The springs get their water from a natural underground reservoir producing an incredible 250 million litres of fresh water a day. These springs supply most of the water consumed in the city of Mombasa.

The lush, hippo and crocodiles-inhabited pools of Mzima springs, fed daily by millions of litres of water gushing from the lava flow of the Chyulu Hills, provide an oasis of green, underwater chamber where fish, hippo and crocodiles can be viewed.







Both night and daytime game drives are possible to give guests the opportunity to view both diurnal and nocturnal animals.



### Chaimu Crater

One of the few but most memorable hiking opportunities in the Tsavo!

haimu crater offers a spacious parking area and an exciting scramble up to this volcanic cinder cone that leads to the craters rim. This is an excellent spot for hiking.



#### The Shetani Caves and Lava Flows

When the spectacle of past geological activity is too breathtaking that locals associated it with supernatural powers!

he volcanic convulsions of Tsavo's landscape are riddled with lava flows, the most spectacular being the Shetani Lava flow, a coalesced tide of tar-like lava that spewed down the Chyulu Hills as they burst out of the plains only a few hundred years ago. Shetani means 'devil' in Swahili and refers to the time, relatively recently, when the molten lava erupted from the bowels of the earth and engulfed the area. So terrifying was this event to the local people that they believed it to be the devil incarnate and the tales are still rife of fire, hails of brimstone and evil spirits. The lava flow is also riddled by a series of caves, many of which can be explored, though caution is recommended.

## Roaring Rocks

A view of the Tsavo National Park from a vantage point where the wind howls into your ears!

nce climbed, the Roaring Rocks provide amazing panoramic views, usually only seen by the eagles and buzzards that fly around these cliffs, over the plain called Rhino valley and the Ngulia. The Roaring rocks, located near the Rhino Sanctuary, has been for long an observation point for the protection of the black rhino and the fight against poaching.

The eerie Roaring Rocks are named after the buzz of cicadas that inhabit them and the howl of wind that hits the bare rocks, producing a roaring sound.

### **Bush Dining**

When the food couldn't get any better, throw in a view to die for!

djacent to the Lodge is our dedicated bush barbeque area, which overlooks the Chyulu Hills and is traditionally lit with safari lanterns. Reached by a winding, lantern-lit pathway from the lodge, it features a stone-built buffet-area, bush bar and a glowing charcoal barbeque. Here, our chefs prepare a lavish 7-course banquet, which is served to individual tables gathered around a blazing fire-pit. At the end of dinner, our guitarist entertains you as drinks are served around the bonfire. A special cultural dancing troup may also be at hand to entertain you.
